Our Community – Did You Know...?

Our local population has increased by 2.7% since 2010; however, it is expected to stay level for the next ten years. There has been a 3.1% increase in the number of households which is expected to continue as a modest increase. The proportion translates to fewer people per household, meaning, sadly, fewer children in our

church community. Our largest growth group is age 65 and over. This is reflected in the average age in our community increasing by 6.9% since 2010, putting us at 39.69 for average age. In New York State the average age in the same time period went up by 7.9% to 40.96, so, in comparison, we're youngsters



Freeze Your Credit Bureau Accounts and Why You Should

To prevent identity theft, you can freeze your credit with the following bureaus:

Freezing your credit bureau accounts is a proactive step to protect yourself from identity theft and unauthorized access to your credit. This process restricts lenders and other entities from accessing your credit report without your explicit consent, making it nearly impossible for fraudsters to open accounts in your name.

Steps to Freeze Your Credit

Contact the Major Credit Bureaus: Reach out to the three major credit reporting agencies—Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. Each bureau requires a separate request.

Verify Your Identity: Be prepared to provide personal information, such as your Social Security number, date of birth, and government-issued ID.

Request the Freeze: Submit your request online, by phone, or by mail. Most bureaus allow you to set up an account for easier management of the freeze.

Obtain a PIN or Password: Upon approval, you'll receive a PIN or password to manage your freeze. Keep this information secure.

Benefits of Freezing Your Credit

Enhanced Security: Prevents unauthorized access to your credit report.

Cost-Free Protection: Freezing and unfreezing your credit is free in the U.S.

Control Over Your Credit: You can lift the freeze temporarily if needed, such as when applying for a loan.

Important Considerations

A freeze does not impact your credit score or existing accounts.

You may need to lift the freeze for specific purposes, which can take a few days depending on the bureau and method.

Monitor your existing accounts regularly for suspicious activity, as a freeze only protects against new accounts being opened fraudulently.

Freezing your credit is a simple yet effective way to safeguard your financial identity. Take action today to ensure peace of mind and added protection against fraud.


